2015 started with a cover story on AURA and the Anthropocene period in Jyllandsposten that took up the entire front page of the January 29 edition. It was followed up by a ten-page background story in the paper (see attachment). AURA's outreach to the general public as well as to an academic audience was continued throughout the year with an acclaimed art exhibition at Aarhus Kunsthal and an associated international art-science workshop. The scholarly output has also been steadily increasing with over 29 international publications; the hosting of the transdisciplinary conference Postcolonial Natures and of a PhD course. In total members of AURA gave 61 invited talks and presentations during the year. In addition AURA organized two panels at the prestigious annual meeting of the American Anthropological Association and one panel at the Finnish Anthropological Society meeting.

A major event in 2015 was the transdisciplinary conference Postcolonial Natures in June. The conference, which was organized by Heather Swanson and co-funded by AURA and the research program Contemporary Ethnography, explored how histories of inequality and oppression haunt landscapes and shape multispecies lives. The conference brought together five preeminent scholars from across the borders of postcolonial theory and landscape studies: Itty Abraham (National University of Singapore), Lesley Green (University of Cape Town), Shiho Satsuka (University of Toronto), Marcos Lopez (Bowdoin College), and Paulla Ebron (Stanford University).

## Exhibition: DUMP! Multispecies Making and Unma-

Between June and September, AURA co-hosted with Kunsthal Aarhus the innovative and multi-sensory art exhibition DUMP! Multispecies Making and Unmaking at Aarhus Kunsthal. The exhibition gathered artists, scientists and organisms to prope the practices of multispecies collaboration that emerge in the ruins of modernity and industrialized progress.
